- Being an evening college has its limitations. Though the area is safe at night with police vigil from our local Shyampukur Police Station and congenial for girl students, the number of enrolment of female students is not encouraging because not many families like their daughters to stay out late in the night. Some female students who take admission do not attend later classes on a regular basis. Many male students work in the daytime at call centres and factories where shift duties affect their attendance in college. But despite difficulties we have addressed this problem by giving fee concessions and waiver as an incentive to encourage families to send their children to attend classes.
